Curry comb	The first brush used in the grooming process to loosen the dirt and hair on the horse. This brush is rubber and has ridges.
Hard brush	The second brush used in the grooming process to remove the loosened dirt and hair. This brush has hard bristles.
Soft brush	The third brush used in the grooming process to give the horse's coat a shine. This brush is used as the finishing brush and has soft bristles.

Hoof pick	This tool is used to pick dirt and stones out of the horses' feet.
Mane & tail brush	This is used to brush the horses' mane and tail, just like brushing your own hair!
Halter	This goes over the horse's head. A lead rope is clipped to the ring on the bottom so that the horse can be led around.
Lead rope	A rope that attaches to the halter to lead the horse.

Fly mask	A fly mask keeps flies and bugs out of the horse's face and some fly masks have longer noses that protect from sunburn.
Fly spray	Fly spray is sprayed on the horse to keep the flies away. It has a funny smell!
Horse Blanket	Turnout blankets are intended for a horse to wear outside, and include features such as waterproofing. Turnout blankets allow freedom of movement and breathability, while keeping the horse warm and dry.
English saddle	This is a type of saddle that a person sits in when riding a horse.

Western saddle	This is a type of saddle that a person sits in when riding a horse. It is bigger than an English saddle and has large horn in the front that the rider can hold on to.
Bridle	A bridle goes on the horse's head while a person is riding. The reins go over the horse's neck and are used to guide the horse.
Girth	This goes around the horse's belly and holds the saddle on while riding.

Pitchfork	This tool is used to scoop and pick up horse poop!
Muck bucket	This is filled with horse poop!
Helmet	A rider always wears a helmet while riding.

Breeches	A type of pant used for riding.
Paddock boots	Special boots used for riding.
Half chaps	These protect the rider's legs from rubbing on the saddle while riding.
Riding Gloves	Riding gloves protect a rider's (or handler's) hands from friction, blisters or burns that can occur while handling reins, long lines or leads, and they can provide added grip for a secure hold.
